I trust that experiences and anecdotes from my Jungian teachers, and especially my reflections, may be of value to those in attendance - relevant to genetics, epigenetics, genealogy, family stories, ancestors, and the archetypes of the collective unconscious - where patterns of world events and human patterns lodge in each one of us. This will come with pointers for those wanting to do their own work and for opportunities for audience members, in silence, who may wish to do so, to note very briefly how these categories apply to them personally.



David Roomy is author of several books on Jungian psychotherapy; he is a lifetime practitioner in this field, now formally retired. His master's degree from Union Theological Seminary, NYC, was in the Program of Psychiatry and Religion in its second year of inception. Jungian psychology and religion/spirituality, on an intercultural and interfaith basis, have always been his areas of study, teaching, and practice. Early in his stay in New York, he began working with M. Esther Harding probably the first Jungian Analyst in North America. During the same period, he was the associate of William H. Kennedy, in a program of cross-cultural exchange and dialogue, employing Jungian insights during the height of the Cold War. Kennedy, as the ward of C. G. Jung, grew up in Jung's home. David lived in England for seven years and now lives in Vancouver, B. C., with his wife, Cyndy.
